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World Biodiversity Conference in Valencia, Spain a Huge Success



At the November 11-15, 2008, World Conference on Marine Biodiversity in Valencia, Spain, a large number of Census of Marine Life projects and scientists presented their

latest research results in a five-day meeting that clearly demonstrated the enormous progress in the field over the last few years. The Census was one of more than two dozen supporting organizations for the Conference which was organized by the European Union Network of Excellence, MarBEF. Nearly 600 scientists from 42 countries were present at the Conference organized at a most impressive venue, the City of Arts and Sciences. Besides giving 200 oral presentations and nearly as many posters, the participants discussed and agreed upon a Valencia Declaration for the Protection of Marine Biodiversity. The Scientific Steering Committee of the Census of Marine Life is pleased to support this declaration.

Vulnerable Marine Ecosystems in Antarctica

CAML Scientists have contributed support and evidence that led to the the designation of two areas of the Southern Ocean as Vulnerable Marine



Ecosystems by the Convention for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources (CCAMLR). Data collected last January during the Collaborative East Antarctic Marine Census Expedition has proven instrumental in persuading CCAMLR to protect two 400 sq km areas of the Southern Ocean that support particularly lush communities of bryozoan, coral, and sponges. In the short term, these vulnerable marine ecosystems, the first to be declared in the Antarctic region, will be protected from fishing. A permanent management system, which is currently in the works, will then provide long term protection of these habitats. Squat Lobster Catalog is Zootaxa's Most Accessed Paper



A squat lobster catalog with distribution and bibliographic data, which is the result of a 2007 meeting sponsored by COMARGE, was published in the Journal *Zootaxa* in October of



this year. Also available on the journal's website, this article has been accessed more than 3000 times in the first five weeks after its release, making it Zootaxa's most accessed paper ever. It is also very likely the most comprehensive freely accessible set of taxonomy information on a marine taxon. The catalog list 870 known species from many diverse ocean realms. More details are

Antarctic Study Reveals Surprising Biodiversity



A recent article in the Journal of Biogeography (online early view, link below) releases the results of the first comprehensive inventory of life in the Antarctic, a 2006 British

Antarctic Survey expedition associated with the Census of Antarctic Marine Life. Quite notably, the article describes the South Orkney Islands as having more species than than the Galapagos and many other tropical and temperate systems. These findings are in opposition to the prevailing point of view that polar environments support relatively low biodiversity. A Dec 4 Editorial from the New York Times (Antarctic Archipelago) also discusses this research from the perspective of ecological change; the South Orkney Islands appear to be relatively unchanged over the past century, allowing this inventory to serve as a good baseline against which future change may be measured. New Co-Chairs Appointed to Lead EuroCoML




Last month Professor Graham Shimmield, having relocated to the USA, has officially stepped down as chair of EuroCoML Executive and Steering
